Focus On 7th Grade

Language Arts: students are currently participating in the Newspapers in Education program sponsored by the News Tribune. This program provides the students with copies of the paper to use as a foundation for writing and grammar activities in the classroom. They are also continuing their presentation of the morning announcements. The up and coming units include a public-speaking mini-unit and a storybook creation unit.

Literature students have spent the beginning of the third quarter reviewing the elements of literature and preparing for the ISAT.
