
Rescue & Jessica A Life-Changing Friendship



When will I be able to walk again?


What will my life be like?

Her whole family was worried about her, and she didn't want to let anyone down.












At the hospital, Jessica was learning new ways to do things that used to come easily.


She used a wheelchair to get around.







She put on a prosthetic leg so she could stand.





















Rescue stood up very tall. He hoped she didn't notice his legs were trembling.

Jessica knew that even though Rescue was special, he was a regular dog, too. She made sure that Rescue had playtime every day.






The night after the doctor removed her right leg, Rescue knew just what to do to help Jessica, all on his own.















